Reflections on the Beginnings of TEC as a Conference.....

I recall being relatively new to TEC, about one year, and being invited to attend a national gathering of TEC centers. The time was Memorial Day Weekend, 1978. Location was a college campus in the Belleville, Illinois

Diocese, just outside of St. Louis. It was there that I met Sr. Mary Neurohr, a sister of the Most Precious Blood of Ruma, Ill., and a leader of Belleville Illinois TEC, and other leaders from TEC centers from around the country.

As luck would have it, I happened to be in on the early discussions about organizing a national TEC Conference, and the need to formalize these summer gatherings for the purpose of learning from each other, both formally through training and informally through friendship. Over that year, many discussions were held. The following Memorial Day weekend, we enjoyed the hospitality of the Grand Rapids Michigan TEC center, with a conference held at Aquinas College. It was there that we formalized the conference in its structure and wrote its bylaws and constitution. We were now the National TEC Conference, with Sr. Mary Neurohr as our first executive director, based out of an office located in the basement of Chancery of the Diocese of Belleville. Our first Episcopal (bishop) advisor was Bishop Maurice Dingman of Des Moines. I was chosen as the first president of the new fledgling organization, and together we sailed off into uncharted seas.

Two difficulties faced us immediately: finances and awareness of TEC around

the country. With the establishment of a new national organization and office, we had to fund the operation very quickly. I think our first year's budget was something around \$12,000. Quite a sum, considering that we were starting from scratch. We had to establish a dues benchmark that charged our new member TEC centers a base, yearly dues amount. We also had to establish a per TEC'er/TEC'ite attendee fee, so that larger clubs who could contribute more, would.

Secondly, we had to begin our promotion of Serra to Dioceses around the country. In those days, (I feel like I am saying that a lot in this piece...In those days...) there was a relatively small and young national youth ministry program. In many dioceses across the country, TEC became and WAS THE youth ministry program for a while. Of course, many people were initially interested in this new retreat dynamic called TEC. ("Dynamic" because many of us at the time thought it was just a dynamic, not realizing the incredible spiritual and psychological depth that was the part and partial of this weekend. We later found this to be a mis-conception.) So, Sr. Mary Neurohr would find herself traveling to many places around the country, promoting TEC to youth ministry organization, NFCYM, and attending outside ministry activities like one called the SPERO Training weekends. It was there that we acquired our next group of national TEC leaders.

Speaking at the Grand Rapids, Mich. TEC summer conference were two soon to be TEC executive leaders, Fr. Mike Carroll, diocesan priest from Green Bay TEC and Sr. Sue Torgerson, CSJ, from the Chicago TEC. *Continued on pg. 2*

Reflections Upon the Beginnings of TEC as a National Conference, Con'tBy Greg Schwietz

Fr. Carroll was introducing eager attendees to the writings of Robert Greenleaf concerning Servant Leadership. Sr. Sue had become a regular attendee at TEC conferences and was deeply involved in TEC activities in the Chicago and Joliet Archdiocese. Upon invitation, they enthusiastically agreed to help us steer the TEC Movement.

Rounding up the executive committee was Mr. Francis Schaefer as treasurer. Francis Schaefer, now-deceased, was a friend of Sr. Mary Neurohr. Francis Schaefer was an early supporter of Sr. Mary's involvement with TEC in the local Belleville diocese, and was a long time member of the Serra Club of Belleville. He was also familiar with the Serra international organization's leaders in Chicago, as they were with him. He and Sr. Mary submitted for a grant to assist for that first year's budget and were successful in obtaining, through the graciousness of the Serra Foundation, a \$5,000 unrestricted grant for operating expenses. Serra International as an organization of 17,000 members worldwide, has as its mission to promote vocations to the priesthood and vowed religious life. Serra saw the important link of TEC's unique gift of lighting a fire of faith in young people's lives, and increasing the probability of a young person listening for the call of God's will for them to serve his people in his Church. TEC also provides a strong peer support group to assist young people in their discernment. I know of a number of priests in my own diocese who heard their calling as a result of a TEC weekend and being part of a TEC community.

The next year, Memorial Day weekend in 1980, the newly formed National TEC Conference held its annual convention in Denver at Regis College. In preparation for that convention, we decided to obtain as many TEC manuals from the various TEC centers as we could do an evaluation of the variety of TEC around the country. TEC, in its early incarnation, was a gift from God for his young people as He inspired Fr. Matt Fedewa of the Battle Creek Diocese. It was Fr. Matt's inspiration and training that provided the background to wed group dynamics with the gospel message of the Pascal Mystery, resulting in a transformational retreat weekend. It was Sr. Concetta (Dorothy Gereke) who organized nearly 200 TEC retreats over a four year period in Battle Creek. However, as Fr. Fedewa reflects, he had no idea it would spread as it did, since in his mind he was really designing it with only the students of the local diocese in mind. Early on, many seekers traveled to Battle

Creek from outside the diocesan boundaries, and TEC as a retreat movement became viral, before anyone knew what "going viral" meant.

During this period of organic growth, many TEC centers were started by other clubs in the same manner. For example, Dubuque sent some early enthusiastic youth directors to Battle Creek to see what the fuss was all about. Fired up, TEC was quickly started in Dubuque and word got out. So then, Dubuque started Des Moines. After some years, Des Moines started Omaha. Again, after more years, Omaha started Wichita and others, etc. In the process, without the strong guide of a national hand, TEC evolved much like what happens when a message is passed on from one person to another. After a while the current version doesn't look anything like the original. Well, I must confess, many of us didn't know that that was such a bad thing, but we didn't really know what made TEC a TEC. We had lost contact with the original, founding diocese as TEC had burnt out all its leaders within a four year period. Fr. Matt and Sr. Concetta both felt their work was done, and had moved on in their life.

In what became a very pivotal discussion over that weekend in Denver, Fr. Brown and I revealed the potential that we were faced with -- a complete dissolution of the identifying characteristics of TEC. It was from that first convention that a Manuals Committee was formed. From that moment forward, TEC grew up, attempting to discover what makes TEC unique and what makes TEC better. That moment lead to the re-acquaintance of Dorothy Gereke and of Fr. Matt Fedewa with his unknown child that had grown up, one called the national TEC Conference. But that is a subject of a future article.

Sr. Mary Neurohr served as executive director for approximately five years, after which time the conference headquarters briefly moved to a Chicago suburb and then on to Omaha, where it resided with Sr. Joy Connealy, ND, serving as executive director for 10 years.

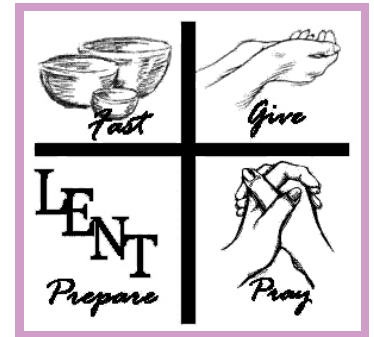

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
