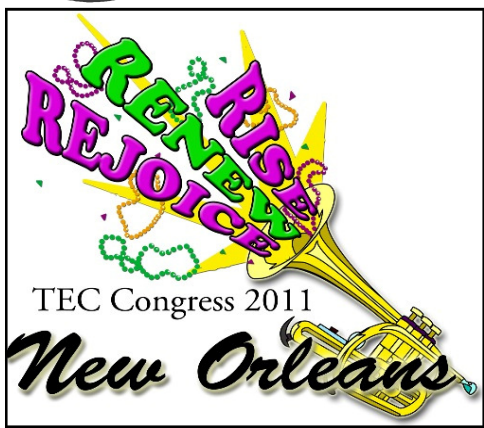
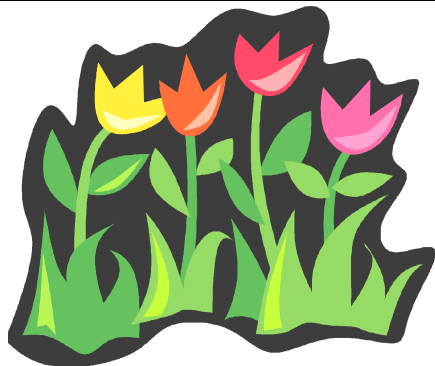

Highlights of TEC.....by Mike Ellis

Serving as executive director from 1989 - 1995 was a blessing. Those years has helped me in my parish ministry. All the trainings helped me develop adult education programs, be a good liturgical minister and become a good preacher.

The manuals committee met frequently to continue developing of the revised manual. Numerous workshops were held from 1990 - 1996 (see below) to help form and train adult leaders in the different spiritual processes and components of the TEC encounter experience that was laid out in the Manual.

- 1992: Discipleship: Growing As Servant Leaders, Peoria, Ill.**

Recent Deceased TEC Family Spiritual Directors

Fr. Ken Opat September 3, 1942 - April 6, 2011

Fr. Kenneth M. Opat, osc, who was the founding director of one of the most successful Together Encountering Christ retreat programs in the country, died April 6 in Onamia, Minn., at the age of 68.

Fr. Ken attended the Crosier Our Lady of the Lake Seminary in Syracuse Indiana, eventually entering the Crosier novitiate in 1962. He professed first vows in 1963, and was ordained into the priesthood on May 10, 1969, by Bishop Leo Pursley of Fort Wayne, Ind.

Beginning in 1969, Fr. Ken served the Crosier Order and the Church on the faculty of Crosier Seminary in Onamia, at various times holding the positions of teacher, registrar, counselor, facilities director, and vice-rector. Other Crosier assignments included service as Provincial Treasurer, as well as Superior of the Crosier house in Anoka, Minn. In 1978, Fr. Ken helped found the Central Minnesota TEC program in the Diocese of St. Cloud, helping to make it one of the most successful TEC programs anywhere in the country. In 2008, he became TEC Director Emeritus, giving his all to the Together Encountering Christ retreat experience until the end.

Fr. Ken was born on Sept. 3, 1942, in Hammond, Ind. to George and Veronica (Wozniczka) Opat. He is survived by one brother and his Crosier confreres.

Harley H. Harris April 2, 1928 - March 31, 2011

Harley was born on April 2, 1928 in Moline, Ill., the son of Dean W. and Gladys (Miller) Harris, Sr. He was a graduate of Moline High School. Harley proudly served his country in the US Navy stationed at Great Lakes. He was united in marriage to Marcella M. Covemaker at home on May 28, 1947 and then later at Sacred Heart Catholic Church, Moline. As a young man, he was part-owner of a single engine airplane and maintained his pilot's license for years following. Harley was previously a co-owner with his wife Marcella of two businesses: Highland Provision, and Har-Cel Woodcraft. He retired May 1988 from Desaulnier's Printing Company, and from Montgomery Elevator. Harley was ordained as a permanent deacon May 1988 through the Peoria Diocese and assigned to St. Malachy's Catholic Church, Geneseo. As a retiree, he worked at various part-time jobs as a Deacon. He was the Spiritual Director of TEC (Teens Encounter Christ) for two years: 1988 – 1990. Harley was a member of St. Malachy's Catholic Church. He enjoyed flying, hunting, fishing and building model airplanes.

Survivors include his wife Marcella, children Michelle (Chris) Fisher, Albuquerque, NM; Marsha (Robert) Ackerman, Alpharetta, GA; Marlo Greer, and significant other Alan Bishop, Rock Island, Melissa I. Harris, Milan; eight grandchildren, three step grandchildren, five great-grandchildren, two step great-grandchildren, siblings Aaron (Sherry) Harris, Palm Desert, CA; Francis W. "Pete" (Myrna) Harris, Moline; William H. (Jean) Rasmussen, Coal Valley.

He was preceded in death by his parents, a son-in-law Jim Greer, two brothers Frederick and Dean and two sisters Billie-Jayne Lipke and Patricia Hill.
